DREAM RUN CONTINUES

The ANZ Commodity Price Index lifted 4.7 percent in the month of March, hitting a new record high. This represents the seventh consecutive monthly rise in the index, with the latest month also being stronger than any of the preceding six monthly increases.

Fourteen commodity prices increased in March and three were unchanged. For the first time in seventeen years there wasn't a single decrease in the price of any individual commodity in the basket of 17 commodities that we monitor.


The **price of wool strengthened 12 percent** in March, with prices having doubled in the past 12 months. **Whole milk powder prices also rose 12 percent**, ahead of a 7 percent rise in skim milk powder prices. Lumber and skin prices also increased by 7 percent rise in the month. Beef and log prices grew 3 percent in the month; lamb, casein, butter and aluminium prices lifted 2 percent; venison and cheese prices rose 1 percent; and seafood prices increased by ½ percent. The export prices of wood pulp, kiwifruit and apples were unchanged over the month.

The value of the New Zealand dollar weakened in March. Consequently the rise in the locally priced ANZ NZD Commodity Price Index was magnified, **lifting 8.1 percent from the preceding month**, to an all time high. The NZ dollar priced commodity index is 25 percent higher than its level a year ago, and nearly double the low point recorded in February 2009, which followed the global financial crisis. The New Zealand economy is poised to benefit from the increased rural income that will inevitably filter through the economy. Soft rural land values and a strong focus on the balance sheet has curtailed the benefit to the broader economy. This will not continue indefinitely. It is only a matter of time before this rejuvenation spills over into other pockets of the economy.




FEATURED COMMODITY: WOOD PULP

International wood pulp prices have followed the direction recorded in most other commodity markets. Prices slumped along with reduced world-wide demand in early 2009, but rebounded strongly to hit a new high 18 months later. Nearly all of our wood pulp exports are sent to the Asian rim, with China taking over a quarter of our wood pulp exports.

Wood pulp is the key ingredient in the manufacture of paper and paperboard. Pulp is derived by breaking down the fibrous cellulose contained in wood (or any plant material) into its component fibres. The method of breakdown is done by either a mechanical or chemical process. The latter option is known as the 'kraft' process. The kraft process involves the use of caustic sodium hydroxide and sodium sulphide to extract the lignin from the wood fibre. The name of this process is derived from German word *kraft*, meaning strong. It was first developed 120 years ago and now is used for about 80 percent of the worldwide production of paper.

The process of paper making, in simplistic terms, involves mixing wood pulp (or other vegetable fibres) with water. This slurry is spread, making a thin layer of matted fibrous strands. The water is then removed, and the layer of fibres remaining is essentially a crude form of newsprint. Other materials may be added to give the paper a better surface or extra strength.




The global financial crisis resulted in a slump of many international commodity prices, and wood pulp was included in the list. A weakening in demand for print advertising contributed to softer demand for printing and writing paper in the United States and Europe. Weaker industrial demand, especially from Asia, has been another factor that drove the price lower. However, demand has since recovered, and prices have rebounded with some degree of certainty returning to the international marketplace, combined with a run down of inventories.

In the twelve months to February 2011, wood pulp exports totalled NZ\$720 million, which accounted for just over 1½ percent of New Zealand's total merchandise exports. Wood pulp represents a fifth of all forestry related exports (logs, timber, pulp and paper).



China took over a quarter of all of New Zealand's wood pulp exports in the twelve months to February 2011. The next largest shares of pulp exports were sent to Japan, Indonesia, Korea and Australia. The Asian rim takes the lion's share of our wood pulp exports, with the APEC region receiving 96 percent of all wood pulp exported from New Zealand.



Indonesia has the highest import penetration of our wood pulp exports, with wood pulp representing 12 percent of all merchandise exports sent to that country. The import penetration figure drops to 6 percent for exports to Korea, 5 percent for Thailand, and 4 percent for China and Taiwan.

If you wish to pay investment money to the Bank you can do this in several ways such as by:

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- Providing a cheque payable to the relevant product or service provider and crossed 'not transferable'; or
- Making an automatic payment or payment through another electronic delivery mechanism operated by the Bank.

Investment property (other than money) may be delivered to the Bank by lodging the relevant property (for example, share certificates) with any branch of the Bank offering a safe custody service, or by posting (using registered post) the documents or other property to a branch of the Bank, identifying your name, account number and investment purpose.
